

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Nevada Trail Stewards program is a volunteer program that provides a means for private citizens to work with a variety of federal, state, and local land managers and public safety officials in Nevada to promote responsible trail use recreation on public, state, and private lands. These volunteers contribute their time, experience, and local knowledge of trail areas in Nevada by monitoring public lands in groups of two or more. Through these monitoring efforts volunteers provide a positive image of their recreation activity, identify and record road, trail, and other resource issues, report misuse of lands, and participate in special projects to enhance trail areas in Nevada. Trail Stewards receive extensive training from professional representatives and serve as a point of contact for other trail users to obtain helpful and informative information about the trails they ride.

STEWARD QUALIFICATIONS

Trail Stewards Must:

- Be at least 18 years old
- Possess a valid driver's license
- · Be an experienced trail user who is able to navigate roads and trails of varying difficulty level and length
- Complete and keep current with all required Steward trainings
- Be able to walk over uneven terrain
- Be able to lift at least 30 pounds
- Wear personal protective equipment

BASIC TRAIL STEWARD ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- Promote responsible recreation use in Nevada by modeling appropriate trail safety and behavior
- Assist land management agencies in monitoring the areas, roads, trails, and facilities used by the public
- Provide a recognizable presence on motorized routes and at trail facilities used by the public
- Protect the privilege of enjoying trail recreation opportunities on public lands by promoting a positive image of trail recreation on public lands
- Promote land stewardship by participating in site improvements and small projects. Projects may include installing kiosks, trail maintenance/restoration/rehab, trash clean up's, etc.
- Distribute and communicate information about responsible trail use and agency policies to casual trail users at highprofile public outreach events and Stewardship activities

EXPERIENCE

Anyone who is and avid trail user or simply an interested member of the public, can volunteer as a Nevada Trail Steward, provided they are willing to abide by the Nevada Trail Stewards Code of Conduct. Trail Stewards will be selected without regard to race, creed, religion, age, sex, color, national origin, or disability.

NEVADA TRAIL STEWARD CODE OF CONDUCT

It is essential that Trail Stewards be guided by a responsible use and conservation ethic.

A TRAIL STEWARD SHALL:

- 1. MAINTAIN PERSONAL SAFETY. A Trail Steward must consider his/her own safety first.
- 2. BE PROFESSIONAL. A Trail Steward shall maintain high standards of honesty, integrity, courtesy, impartiality, and professionalism. It is suggested that a Trail Steward remove his/her full face helmet when making a public contact.
- **3. RESPECT THE PUBLIC.** As a representative of the State and Federal agencies that participate in the Program, a Trail Steward shall be courteous and informative on public lands and respectful of private property.
- 4. AVOID CONFLICTS OF INTEREST. A Trail Steward shall not engage in activities that represent conflicts.
- 5. MODEL APPROPRIATE TRAIL SAFETY AND BEHAVIOR. A Trail Steward sets the example for other recreationists and visitors to follow, therefore, a Steward will wear proper Trail Steward Insignia in order to be easily recognized by the public. A Trail Steward will also properly maintain his/her vehicle and equipment in good working order.
- **6. REPORT VIOLATIONS.** A Trail Steward shall report suspected violators of laws.
- 7. **AVOID NEGATIVE CONFRONTATIONS.** A Trail Steward will not contact or become involved with any individuals that are participating in illegal activities such as illegal shooting, unsafe driving, or physical abuse. Instead, the Steward should discreetly contact a law enforcement or compliance officer immediately.
- 8. **OBEY ALL FEDERAL, STATE, AND LOCAL LAWS.** A Trail Steward will adhere to all federal laws, state statutes, agency regulations, local ordinances, or any other type of regulation.
- 9. **BE CALM AND USE YOUR BEST JUGDEMNET AT ALL TIMES.** If a Steward is unsure of how to proceed they should seek direction of a Coordinator or Mentor.
